Every time someone leaves it all and goes with God, their lives begin to take on new meaning. The theme is fairly consistent for those who've been through the experience, regardless of what age it occurs. They end up doing something drastically different than what they were trained to do, and they do it with a beginners mind, without expectation. This was the experience of JoAnne Kuehner, Founder & President of Hope for Haiti, an organization dedicated to connecting one of the poorest countries in the western hemisphere to one of the wealthiest cities, Naples, FL. Hope for Haiti's mission is to improve the quality of life for the Haitian people, particularly children, through education, nutrition and healthcare. JoAnne, the speaker at today's Mass, took one trip to Haiti 20 years ago and fell in love.

JANUARY 16TH: ANOTHER BAPTISM STORY

ast week, we read the Matthaean version of Jesus' baptism by John. Here we read another Version, by an evangelist writing from a different tradition than did Matthew, Mark or Luke. We see, however, significant similarities. Remember, John the Baptizer had been referred to in the Prologue, only 14 verses earlier. More importantly, the Fourth Evangelist wants there to be no uncertainty that 1) John was the precursor of Jesus and proclaimed Him as God's Chosen One (see first reading); and 2) while John baptized with water, Jesus would baptize with the Spirit. He testified to the fact that he saw the Spirit come down from

Heaven "like a dove" and rest on Jesus; and, further, he had been instructed by God that this was the way the Messiah would be recognized. Thus the Evangelist begins his account of the Lord in a way that leaves no questions about who he is talking about. It is from readings like this that the Church understands the effect of Baptism. As it is a rite of initiation into the People of God, it also brings the Spirit into our lives. This is how we, too, should be recognized, as those whose lives reflect the presence of the Holy Spirit, in bringing the Gospel to everyone through our daily actions in the marketplace, neighborhood and families.

Some facts about Hope for Haiti...

- Supports four nutrition clinics, which save the lives of over 5,000 children per year who are suffering from malnutrition.
- Nutrition clinics provide education on critical life-saving information to mothers and fathers regarding the health of their children.
- Provides financial and medical support to over 60 healthcare and nutrition centers, touching the lives of over 500,000 people.



Hope for Haiti provides evening courses in sustainable agriculture. When tree are taken off the hillside for burning, they are replenished with roughage.

- Over the last 10 years, they've provided over \$40,000,000 in aid, fifteen of which went directly to medications and medical supplies.
- Four Star Rating from Charity Navigator, the preeminent independent evaluator of charities.

Hope for Haiti partner schools receive financial funding for teacher salaries and often support for specific community or classroom needs (i.e. construction, school materials, benches/blackboards, children's shoes/clothing, first aid supplies, clean water, etc...). The Haitian education system is a continual challenge, but Hope for Haiti is dedicated to working to improve the quality and access for the Haitian children. Hope for Haiti believes in partnerships and collaboration, most importantly in the area of education. They work to bring other organizations together who are in the education field to avoid overlap and wasted resources and to encourage non-profit organizations, community leaders, and government representatives to work together.

Sacrament Preparation

Sacrament Preparation programs are a minimum of two consecutive years. In year I students must be enrolled in our Faith Formation, EDGE or High School Youth programs. During year II of formation additional classes are held specific to the Sacraments your child is preparing to receive. After the celebration of the sacraments, catechesis and ongoing conversion carries on through participation in our Faith Formation programs in the years that follow up to grade 12. Your family must be registered and actively participating in the parish.

Confirmation

Candidates must complete 2 consecutive years of preparation beginning in the 9th grade, in order to receive the Sacrament of Confirmation at the end of the 10th grade. Your family must be registered and actively participating in the parish for a period of 3 months prior to the beginning of classes. Registration is done through the Faith Formation office.

Diocesan Catholic & Home School Students

Diocesan Catholic School & home school students, who wish to receive their sacraments at Blessed Pope John XXIII Church, are required to register and attend Sacrament classes only. (Their faith formation obligation is met through their school/home religion class.) If you plan to home school your child, you must still register in our home school program for two years. The approved Catholic schools in the Diocese of Venice are St. Francis Xavier, St. Andrew, and Bishop Verot High School. Thanks for your help with the diaper drive! It was very successful, raising over 2,000 diapers for the moms in need at the Ft. Myers Pregnancy Center!

Respect Life

Statement of the Catholic Bishops of Florida on the **38th Anniversary of Roe v. Wade**

January 22, 2011

The first Sunday in October, since 1972, has been set aside by the Catholic bishops in the United States to pray for a culture of life and an end to abortion. While surveys show there is growing support for strict limits on the availability of abortion, unborn babies are still dying from chemical and surgical procedures that sometimes cause the death of the mother. We are grateful for the decline in numbers to 82,000 reported abortions in Florida for 2009 but we grieve over even one untimely death of one of God's creations, a unique and irreplaceable human being.

We are concerned about the growing chorus of voices in society, even among the young people in our church, who reject Church teaching about marriage as the proper union where one man and one woman form a lifelong partnership for the procreation and education of offspring. The current infatuation with sex as a recreational activity with little thought about the person that could be created through the sexual union only perpetuates abortion as a bad solution for what is referred to as a "problem pregnancy." Pornography, sexting, prostitution and other ills distort the sexuality with which God endowed humanity for the expression of mutual self-giving love and perpetuation of the human race.

For a pregnant woman at any stage of life who needs emotional or material assistance for her and her unborn child, the church offers help through crisis pregnancy centers and parish programs such as Gabriel Project. The growth of 40 Days for Life is proof that people are willing and able to help others choose life over the culture of death.

There are people who suffer from guilt and separation from the Church because of participation in an abortion at some point in their life. Healing and God's love, mercy and compassion are there for those who seek confession for what one may feel is an "unforgiveable sin." Project Rachel and Rachel's Vineyard, nationally recognized postabortion programs approved by the Catholic Church, offer a confidential process for healing and reconciliation. The fundamental human right, the presupposition of every other right, is the right to life itself. This is true of life from the moment of conception until its natural end. Abortion, consequently, cannot be a human right—it is the very opposite. (cf. Pope Benedict XVI, 2007 address to Austrian diplomatic corps).

We pray that our great nation will come back to its founding principles, the first of which is that we are all created equal, endowed by our Creator with certain inalienable rights, the most important being the right to life.

Frequently, those seeking to celebrate Marriage, Baptisms or serve as sponsors for Confirmation, or Baptism request a letter stating that they are parishioners. To receive such a letter, one must be registered in the parish, attend Mass regularly, and be committed to stewardship of time, talent and treasure. One means of verifying participation is through the use of parish offertory envelopes. If you choose not to participate in the support of the parish, or are unable to contribute at this time, please at least note your prayerful support on your envelope and place it in the weekly offertory basket. We will then be aware of your continued participation, and you will not be noted as "inactive" on our parish roster.

We will attend January 22nd, Strengthening the Treasure in Your Marriage

It is through partnerships that Hope for Haiti can receive the most return from donors' investments by challenging organizations working within the Haitian education system at all levels to join forces towards a common goal of improvement and success. This challenge is where Hope for Haiti has seen the most progress made in providing the environment for non-governmental organizations, government agencies, and the community to solve the problems together.

(Below) The creek, a source of fresh water, lies a half-mile outside the village of Tete Source, a community served by Hope for Haiti. The creek serves as a place for bathing, swimming and a source for drinking water. Transporting water from the creek into the village provides opportunities for employment for the young, willing and strong.

What are some of the challenges within the education system that Hope for Haiti is working to address?

- Teachers: The overwhelming majority of Haitian primary and secondary teachers are poorly qualified in both private and public schools. Often the teachers are not only unqualified but also face extremely difficult work environments, with little to no access to school materials and very inadequate salaries.
- Facilities: It is well acknowledged that the Haitian education system is far below International standards and that the majority of school "facilities" are beyond inadequate to provide a suitable learning environment. School structures range from being made out of coconut and banana leaves to corrugated metal roofs and concrete blocks. Many lack electricity, bathrooms, clean water, food, first aid, benches, chalkboards, and daily classroom necessities.
- Overage Students: With little to no oversight in education on a government level mixed with abject poverty, schools face a problem with overage students in classes. In Haiti it is not unlikely to graduate High School in your early to mid 20s. This is a testament to both the poor quality and lack of access to education that families and schools must face.
- No Standards: The Ministry of Education unfortunately operates with a bare minimum requirement for quality standards. There is little to no school monitoring or evaluation from outside parties to offer assistance or guidelines for improvement.
- Access: Haiti is still incapable of educating over 50% of her school aged children an enormous number of boys and girls with no hopes of receiving even the most basic of education.

Helen Mark & The Helen Mark Haiti Fund

"In quietness and confidence shall be your strength" [Isaiah 30] is the Scriptural passage that first comes to mind when I think of Helen Mark. Helen was a remarkable woman – with a heart much bigger than her small and dainty stature could possibly hold.

One of my most vivid memories of Helen was when she spoke to the members of our Women's Guild. She held everyone's attention as she retold stories of her nursing career as a U. S. Army WAC, especially those encountered on her arrival at the Scofield Barracks on Oahu, Hawaii shortly after the bombing of Pearl Harbor during World War

II. What was even more awesome was seeing Helen in her WAC uniform some 60 years after she first wore it. She loved her Country and proudly celebrated every opportunity that paid honor to its Veterans.

Helen was a founding member of Blessed Pope John XXIII and loved her Faith Community as well. She was a devoted volunteer at the Thrift Store. She was the main force of our telephone committee which, in our early days, was the primary networking available to us. Helen was the first to coordinate a campaign to provide packages for our Armed Forces Overseas and our Women's Guild maintains that campaign during the month of February. She loved the sound of church bells and believed that they echoed the Gospel message evidenced in a faith community. To that end, Helen generously donated funds to secure the carillon bells for our faith community as an announcement of our credo - "All Are Welcome!"

Again, in quietness and confidence Helen reached out to the people of Haiti. She became involved with the Naples organization, Hope for Haiti, and provided funding for the construction of basic housing for the poorest of families. Helen believed that education was the primary means to a better life. To that end, she donated monies for the construction of a school which now provides better education to over 300 primary school students. Unfortunately, Helen died before her scheduled trip to Haiti for the school's dedication.

Since the January earthquake in Haiti, our parish has become involved with the continuing efforts of Hope for Haiti to provide relief to the thousands of Haitians who were affected by this natural disaster. It was through our involvement that we came to know of Helen's generosity and belief in the Haitian people.

Hope for Haiti has been working with the local people in Haiti for the last twenty years. Our own Father Bob Tabbert was a founding member of this hands-on organization. For six weeks following the earthquake, members of our Social Justice Ministry transported supplies provided by our parishioners to the office of Hope for Haiti in Naples. During this time, we became very familiar with the good works being accomplished in Haiti. We also were made aware of Helen's love for the children of Haiti and came to the conclusion that Helen's efforts should continue forward.

The Helen Mark/Haiti Fund is being proposed as a source of revenue to provide for the continuing education, nutrition,

and healthcare of the Haitian children. We are asking our Parishioners, after thoughtful prayer, to consider making a yearly pledge to fund this campaign. Hope for Haiti has advised us that \$7,000 would supplement the salary of 14 teachers for a school year. An additional \$5,000 would provide services of a Healthcare Worker and a Public Health Program for the children. The pledge amount could be as little as \$25.00 a year or \$25.00 a month. One hundred families pledging \$120 a year would enable us to totally fund both projects.

Tete Source Community Primary School

Tete Source Community Primary School was started in 2000 by Rochel Banatte, who chose to return to his community to start this primary school, knowing that the children of Tete Source had little to no access to an education. The school provides a quality education to over 250 students and receives 100% pass rate on their 6th grade national exam each year. Hope for Haiti also supports the school's teachers in subsidizing their salaries, relieving the burden placed on families to pay school tuition fees. There are six classrooms that were finished in 2009 with the support of buildOn, an international organization focused on empowering local villages through their own development efforts by building schoolhouses in rural communities, and the Loyola Foundation. We are proud to be working with such a dedicated community who values education and is willing to join together to provide the best they can offer for their children.

Thanks to the passion of the late humanitarian, Helen Mark, the neighboring community of Ravine Sable has not only benefited from her generous support, but also recieved help from another donor that resumed Ms. Mark's commitment last year. The community of Tete Source, however, which is in the area and very similar to Ravine Sable, still has many needs, with education being a top priority. Helen Mark would be proud that the parish of Blessed Pope John XXIII is carrying out one of Hope for Haiti's commitments in her memory.

Florida Bishops' Statement on Immigration

January 1, 2011

"When an alien resides with you in your land, do not molest him. You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; have the same love for him as for yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt. I, the Lord am your God."**Leviticus 19: 33 – 34**

We, the Catholic bishops of Florida, are deeply concerned with our nation's flawed immigration system and its impact on the human dignity and lives of our migrant brothers and sisters. This system divides families and causes human suffering to those who search for work in support of their families.

In Florida, our economy is dependent upon manual labor for agriculture, construction and the service industry. Limited numbers of worker visas are available to bring unskilled labor into the U.S. for jobs but too often, demand exceeds need. This has created a market for undocumented workers who may face abuses such as inadequate wages, substandard housing and no benefits with a real threat of exploitation by unscrupulous employers, human smugglers and human traffickers. While the Catholic Church does not advocate for undocumented immigration into the United States, it respects the dignity of the human person and the right to work to meet the basic needs of their families.

The more prosperous nations are obliged, to the extent they are able, to welcome the foreigner in search of the security and the means of livelihood which he cannot find in his country of origin. Public authorities should see to it that the natural right is respected that places a guest under the protection of those who receive him. (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 2241)

The failure of the United States Congress to enact comprehensive immigration reform leaves migrants in search of work without legal protection and vulnerable to mistreatment. At the same time, our State and nation benefits from their work and their taxes, creating a permanent underclass with no rights in our society. In his 1981 encyclical letter, Laborem Exercens, Pope John Paul II expressed that care should be taken to prevent the exploitation of those who must emigrate in order to find work. Furthermore, just legislation must ensure the same criteria apply to immigrant workers as other workers in society. As a moral matter, we cannot accept the toil and taxes of these human beings without offering them the protections of our laws. This is not the American way.

We also have grave concerns about the impact of this flawed system on family unity. Families are the building blocks for society and the place where children are nourished and protected. Too often, backlogs and visa quotas for countries prevent immigrant citizens and legal permanent residents from bringing spouses, parents and minor children from overseas, a wait for some approaching 20 years. The U.S. citizen children of undocumented immigrants are at significant risk if parents are incarcerated and scheduled for deportation.

Our humanitarian concerns with the broken immigration system do not conflict with, but complement the right of the sovereign nation to control its borders. By repairing the system comprehensively, and providing legal means for entry, the nation would replace illegality with legality so that individuals and families could migrate and work in a safe and controlled manner. This would not only protect the rights of the migrant, but also help ensure national security, as law enforcement would be able to focus on those who come to our country to harm us. The Church recognizes the right of a sovereign state to control its borders in furtherance of the common good. It also recognizes the right of persons to migrate so that they can realize their God-given rights. These teachings complement each other. While the sovereign state may impose reasonable limits on immigration, the common good is not served when the basic human rights of the individual are violated. (Strangers No Longer: Together on the Journey of Hope, a joint pastoral statement composed by the Bishops of Mexico and the United States.)

While we support the right of the sovereign nation to control its borders, this does not mean that it should be done in a manner that undermines basic human rights. The vast majority of immigrants to this nation are not criminals, which should be taken into account in any enforcement strategy. The recent increases in deportation and the sometimes inhumane treatment of detainees such as refusal to allow contact with families and no legal representation causes us to question the methods used against those already in fear for their lives. Immigration law is complicated and only trained professionals have current knowledge of the laws, not local law enforcement.

Any passing of laws that give legal sanction to profiling people will decrease public safety and discourage reporting of crime. The so-called 'illegals' are so, not because they wish to defy the law, but because the law does not provide them with any channels to regularize their status in our country which needs their labor. They are not so much breaking the law, as being broken by the law.

Instead of passing local and state laws which cause fear in immigrant communities, Congress must bring these persons out of the shadows so they can fully contribute their talents to our nation. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has consistently advocated for "a path to citizenship" meaning those who are already present and contributing to society could come forward and pay a fine, undergo a comprehensive criminal background check, show they have paid taxes, are learning English and obtain a visa that would lead to permanent residency. Immigration is a federal issue and there must be a federal solution rather than the attempts to craft varying proposals in several states including Florida.

We call upon our federal delegation to lead the fight for comprehensive immigration reform in Congress. We call upon the Florida legislature to resist efforts to demonize those who provide the labor for our economy and a living for their families. Our Catholic Social Teaching and the tradition of the Church affirm the dignity of every human being, made in the image of God.
