

Public Health Program Commences Community Health Worker Training



In February, Hope for Haiti began the training of 13 new community health worker trainees, in a small expansion of the Public Health Program. The 13 trainees come from 8 of our partner schools. They have signed on to attend monthly public health education trainings and to use the knowledge gained to implement important health education topics in their schools. This month, they attended their second module training, where they learned about children's health, diarrhea, dehydration, and worms.
